District of Columbia Caucus Report
January 25, 2019

DC Archives Commission

In its ongoing efforts to address issues with the DC Office of Public Records/City Archives' physical building and condition of its holdings, the District of Columbia City Council recently passed Bill 22-842, establishing an Archives and Records Management Commission. The purpose of the Commission is to review and analyze the District government's archival holdings, their location, condition, management, and public access and to make recommendations to insure their preservation, access, and effective administration. The legislation calls for the Commission to be comprised of 13 members, appointed by DC Mayor Muriel Bowser and confirmed by the Council. Assuming it will not be vetoed, it will move on to the Congress for a mandatory 30-day review.

According to the DC Chief Financial Officer's Fiscal Impact Statement, the Commission "will cost \$196,780 in Fiscal Year 2019 and \$846,710 over the four-year financial plan."

The Friends of the DC Archives, a local volunteer advocacy group comprised of archivists, historians, DC government employees, and anyone interested in recovering and preserving the stories of the District's past, supports the Commission's creation and purpose. Formed several years ago, the FDCA's three main goals are:

- 1. Bring public attention and support for the DC Archives through activism in the District government and with the general public.
- 2. Support appropriations for a new state-of-the art Archives facility.
- 3. Spotlight the Archives' treasures, the dangers posed by current conditions, and the importance of saving the digital records of the city government

Future actions to support the Archives Commission are: (1) submission of names as potential Commission appointees; (2) creating a feasible work-plan outline for the Commission; and (3) testifying at DC Council hearings (budget and Commission member confirmation), particularly in favor of funding of the Commission.

Smithsonian National Museum of American History Internship Opportunity

The <u>Jerome and Dorothy Lemelson Center for the Study of Invention and Innovation</u> at the National Museum of American History, Smithsonian Institution, offers a full-time, 10 week, archival internship opportunity for one graduate student for summer 2019. The internship stipend is \$6,000. **Housing, benefits, and transportation are not provided**. The internship will:

- •Enable new professionals to understand, identify, and manage the historical records of American invention and innovation;
- •Expose interns to the Museum's rich historical collections in the history of technology and 20th century material culture;
- •Provide hands-on experience with archival collections that document invention and innovation;
- •Create EAD finding aids to collections documenting invention and innovation using ArchivesSpace;

and

•Engage interns in discussion of archival issues and practices and provide a wide range of professional experiences within the Museum.

The Application Process

Applicants must apply through the Smithsonian online application system (SOLAA). Internships are located in the Museum's <u>Archives Center</u>, a manuscripts and special collections repository with more than 1,400 collections documenting a wide range of subject areas and a full time staff of eleven. Interns must be enrolled in a graduate degree program and have completed graduate course work in archival, library, or information management, and/or graduate course work in American history, American Studies, Museum Studies, Public History, or another area that relates to the history of invention and innovation in American society. Recent graduates may also apply.

Complete applications must include the following:

Internship Program application form in SOLAA;

- •Undergraduate and graduate transcripts (unofficial transcripts are acceptable);
- Cover letter and resume;
- •Essay discussing your interest in the archival profession and working with invention-related materials; and
- •Two (2) letters of reference.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to consult the <u>Archives Center's Internship FAQ</u> when completing this application.

Applications must be submitted via the <u>SOLAA</u> system by 11:59 p.m. EST on March 1, 2019. Offers will be made by April 8, 2019. The internship begins on or after June 3, 2019. Because of high user volumes, the SOLAA website may exhibit poor performance on the afternoon/evening of March 1. Please plan ahead!

<u>Learnzillion Collaboration Project With DC Public Library Special Collections</u>

LearnZillion is a web-based education software that delivers high quality curricula to teachers and students. DCPL teamed up with LearnZillion to create three Special Collections-related modules, one each for grades 3, 5, and 11, drawing from publications, materials, artifacts, and programs offered by DCPL related to the Poor People's Campaign. The Poor People's Campaign collection provides context for a particular aspect of the civil rights movement in the United States. Also, the campaign marked its 50th anniversary in 2018 and the library's collection documents the campaign locally and nationally. The campaign provides explicit examples of leadership, purpose and outcomes within a grassroots movement. We wanted to provide access to primary resources that explored specific questions about the movement. What were activists seeking? How did they come together to form a movement? Were they successful?

With 26 neighborhood locations, friendly and knowledgeable staff, seven-day-a-week

service, and more than two million unique DC local history items, our goal is to maximize students' opportunities to learn about the city, learn to do research in their city, and develop a deep connection to place. We believe that the items in our collection have the power to help students of all ages form a nuanced understanding of how the events of the past have shaped DC's present day identity, along with the roles and actions students can take to define its future.
